

OVERVIEW

Inflammatory bowel disease is a chronic autoimmune disorder, which targets primarily, though not exclusively, the digestive system. It is traditionally thought to be comprised of two distinct clinical entities, Crohn's disease and ulcerative colitis. The disease affects approximately 10,000 people on Long Island. Patients typically present in their teens-thirties, and there is a second peak of incidence between 40 and 60 years old. As a result, this disease requires close lifetime management at times of flare as well as quiescence. The care of these patients requires close collaboration between pediatric and adult gastroenterology, internal medicine, surgery, obstetrics-gynecology and psychiatry, to name a few disciplines. NYU Winthrop Hospital has been developing this network of providers over the past decade to assure that timely, evidence-based, quality care is provided to all our patients living with IBD.

NYU Winthrop Hospital is a 591 bed academic medical center that has recently affiliated with NYU Langone Medical Center with a firm commitment to community service. We train annually 65 fellows in 24 specialties, and over 250 residents. We were awarded 2015-2018 Excellence Award in Treatment of gastrointestinal bleed and small intestinal surgeries by Healthgrades, an award reserved for the top 5% of national programs. The institution hosts a prestigious Advanced Endoscopy Live Course annually, showcasing our ability to manage complex endoscopic lesions as well as our unique expertise in POEM (per-oral endoscopic myotomy) procedures. Faculty members sit on national committees with such diverse interests as radiology guidelines for colon cancer screening and professional education in IBD management. The American College of Gastroenterology (ACG) also recently awarded NYU Winthrop Hospital a grant for the development of a computerized order set for inpatient IBD management.

The hospital works closely with the Long Island chapter of the Crohn's and Colitis Foundation of America to increase awareness and provide support for both patients living with this disease and providers searching for better treatment methods.

This course brings together a group of experts, who will discuss and engage the audience to help improve the existing knowledge gap, review the latest guidelines and newer treatment options for patients with IBD. The planners of the course believe the learners will gain competence to evaluate and treat patients with IBD and improve care outcomes for their patients in a team approach.
